Irish Wusician Seán Keane Visizs Deer Island

Irish musician Seán Keane has long been fascinated by Irish immigration and its impact on the world. On his latest concert tour in the United States, he received a close-up look at the pain of immigration. Keane visited Deer Island, where sick immigrants escaping the Irish Famine faced quarantine when they arrived in Boston. A Celtic cross monument built by volunteers in 2019 is dedicated to 850 people who died and were buried on Deer Island between 1847 and 1850. "To be standing here so close to their final destination and can you imagine the site for them people after making the grueling journey across the Atlantic in ships who were barely able to keep afloat and then to arrive here and to be looking across at Boston and not being able to get there," Keane said. "It's hard to even imagine. Tough, tough times. Sad times."

During the visit to Deer Island, Keane was accompanied by a delegation from the Irish Pastoral Centre. John McColgan, an IPC board member and retired archivist for the city of Boston, gave a talk on the history of Deer Island. After the shocking news of the Famine reached Boston, \$150,000 was quickly raised in one fundraiser alone to provide relief to the starving Irish, McColgan said. A ship brought 800 tons of food and supplies to Cobh in County Cork, he said. With facilities in Boston overrun by people with highly contagious typhus, the City Council decided to



place sick immigrants on Deer Island away from the city. Two city officials inspected each ship, with the sick sent to a hospital on the island and the other passengers brought to the city, McColgan said. If people became sick on the mainland, they would be shipped back to Deer Island, McColgan said. A burial ground was located behind the hospital, he said, pointing to a map marked "dead house" which was a shed where coffins were made. Keane also visited the Irish Pastoral Centre on March 28, singing "Isle of Hope Isle of Tears." Keane has won numerous awards, including Best Male Folk Performer three times from Irish Music Magazine. All of his solo albums are platinum sellers. His visit to the IPC was part of his work as ambassador to Safe Home Ireland since 2020. Safe Home Ireland is an Irish emigrant support service that provides a range of services for immigrants who want to move back to Ireland, including help with housing, drivers licenses and access to medical care. The organization has helped repatriate about 2,300 people since its founding 22 years ago, Keane said.

"They just have the know-how and wherewithal to be able to make things happen for people who want to move back to Ireland or need any kind of assistance," Keane said. "They do amazing work and I think it's very important work. Having met some of the people that they helped it's been life changing for them." Keane raises awareness of Safe Home Ireland at his concerts and asked people to consider donating to the organization. Keane traces his interest in the work to decades ago when he emigrated for a few years to London. He met older Irish immigrants who endured loneliness and isolation as they worked on motorways and slept in pipes used for bridges on the job sites. Singing songs about immigration was a further education. "Tve been singing immigration songs all my life so that's a great history lesson," Keane said. "As you're learning the songs you're learning a new story in history of Irish immigration and sure the whole tradition in music revolves around immigration because it's such a large part of being Irish."

IS YOUR USA PASSPORT IN DATE?

For international travel, many countries require your U.S. passport to be valid for at least six months beyond the date of your intended stay, and some airlines may refuse boarding if this requirement isn't met.

IRISH PASSPORTS

IPC can assist Irish citizens with their Irish passport first time application and/or renewals. This only applies to Irish Citizens. Call Niamh at the office for more information.

REAL ID

Effective May 7th 2025, the enhanced version of a drivers license or Mass ID takes effect to meet the new Federal Standard for ID's. Your standard license will no longer be accepted for federal purposes including travel throughout the United States. 
SHINE Appointments Available at IPC

The Gift of the Earth Greg Erlandson



Creation is God's tremendous gift to us, designed for our human flourishing. Yet, today, we see signs of destruction and pollution all about us. While many of us so far are protected from the worst of this damage by air conditioning and other modern comforts, hundreds of millions of our brothers and sisters are suffering from the impacts of environmental degradation. Pope Francis issued a stark warning in his encyclical "On Care for Our Common Home." The earth "cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her," he writes (Laudato Si, 2). "The earth was here before us and has been given to us." It is our duty to "protect the earth and to ensure its fruitfulness for coming generations" (IS, 67). God's gift to Noah and his sons remains a gift for us today, proof of a Creator who delights in us and our world's beauty and diversity.



Kerry GAA great Mick O'Dwyer dies aged 88



The Waterville native won four All-Irelands with Kerry as a player before taking over as manager and establishing the county as the game's dominant force in the 1970s and '80s. O'Dwyer's Kerry side lifted Sam Maguire eight times in 12 seasons. GAA president Jarlath Burns said O'Dwyer would go down as "one of the greatest of all time. He will be remembered as an outstanding manager, motivator and mentor. While it is a sad day, it is also an opportunity to reflect on somebody who really changed the way we think of a manager's role with a team. His achievements are incredible." O'Dwyer also had a hand in 23 Munster titles and 11 National League titles during his more than three decades involved with his native county. He stepped down from Kerry in 1989 and went on to manage Kildare, Laois, Wicklow and Clare. With Kildare, he won a pair of Leinster championships and took the county to the All-Ireland final of 1998, their first since 1935, where they were beaten by Galway. He would add another Leinster title with Laois in 2003, the county's first in 57 years, and won the Tommy Murphy Cup with Wicklow. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam dílis - May his

A Moment to Mind Yourself: Can People Change?

"My younger brother is about to lose everything. He was always a bit irresponsible at home, usually going from job to job, leaving when he didn't like it anymore or just being fired. We were delighted when he moved in with his girlfriend last year; maybe he was finally beginning to change. We knew he liked to drink but found out about his drug use when his girlfriend came to see us. She was very upset, saying he would usually come home drunk after work, and at weekends, he rarely came home at all. He always promised her things would change, but they never did for very long. She said she loves him but is scared of him because he's angry, aggressive, and possessive when he uses drugs. She's just found out that she's pregnant and he has lost another job. She's thinking about going home to Ireland, as she's afraid he will never change. I don't know what to say to her, because I don't know either. Can he change?"

It is very upsetting to see someone you love whose life seems to be falling apart. The key thing to remember is that your brother is the only one who can stop this avalanche of problems. Spring is usually a great time for renewal and hope and change is always possible. However, before someone contemplates making any kind of change, there is a theory that some may find useful to review and reflect on. It is called the "Stages of Change" model or "Transtheoretical model of change" and was developed in the late 1970's/early 1980's by James Prochaska and Carlo DiClemente. It was originally designed to help those who were trying to guit cigarettes. Now it is widely used to help people who have problems with alcohol and drugs. Interventions or responses to our loved one's behavior should be adapted to the individual's current stage to maximize engagement and progress. Being able to identify which stage of change our loved one is at can provide us and/or doctor or counselor a clue as to the best way to respond to their struggle. Below you will notice some examples of statements (in bold) that can help you identify how ready someone is to change and, in the section, below, you can see possible interventions that might help.

• **Pre-Contemplation:** "I'm not using drugs. I drink the same as anyone else! It's you who has the problem, not me!" Individuals in this stage are not considering change and may be unaware of the need for it. Interventions at this stage focus on raising awareness and building trust. A Doctor, for example, might take time to explore their current beliefs about their substance use, provide information about the problem (medical risks especially), and emphasize the potential benefits of change. For the man in our story above, he may want

to limit any judgment, as hard as that might be, and build a trusting space so that when his brother is ready to talk about his own concerns, it will be easier.

- **Contemplation:** "There's always a fight when I get home from the pub. I hate waking up with a hangover, but my boss was driving me crazy and I needed to relax. I'll stop tomorrow" but tomorrow never comes. Individuals are aware of the problem and considering change, but have mixed feelings or are ambivalent. Interventions focus on exploring the pros and cons of change, building motivation, and helping them explore options. Techniques like Motivational Interviewing can be helpful at this stage.
- **Preparation:** "That's it! I can't do this anymore. There has to be another way! Where can I get help? What if I can't stop?" Individuals are actively preparing to change, setting goals, and gathering information (like finding an AA meeting to go to or scheduling a meeting with a therapist). Interventions focus on supporting their preparation, developing a plan of action, and building confidence. An example of an unhelpful intervention would be to say "there is no point in trying, you have failed many times before".
- Action: "I could use a drink now, but will find an AA meeting instead." Individuals are actively implementing the change. Interventions focus on providing support, reinforcing new behaviors ("we had so much fun with you when you were sober last night"), and identifying potential challenges. ("Maybe it's too soon to go to your cousin's wedding")
- Maintenance: "I am bringing Mike to a meeting, because it has helped me so much." Individuals are working to sustain the change and prevent relapse. Interventions focus on building relapse prevention strategies, reinforcing positive behaviors, and providing ongoing support. At this stage people tend to start helping other people who are struggling, like accompanying a new person to an AA meeting. Change is always possible, but we don't have to do it alone and support is always available.

Pope Francis: A Beacon of Unity and Progress By Ronald O'Hanleym, Chairman and CEO at State Street

"Too often we participate in the globalization of indifference. May we strive instead to live global solidarity." – Pope Francis



Pope Francis' passing marks the end of an era defined by unity, humility, and progress. In a world increasingly divided, he stood as a voice of compassion, reaching across faiths, borders, and ideologies to foster dialogue and understanding. His papacy was one of many firsts – the first pope from the Americas, the first Jesuit pope, and the first non-European pope in over a thousand years. But beyond these historic milestones, his leadership was defined by a deep commitment to inclusivity and a willingness to engage with the realities of the modern world. He ventured to places no pope had gone before, visiting Iraq, Mongolia, and Myanmar, bringing messages of peace and reconciliation to regions marked by conflict.

Throughout his tenure, Pope Francis led with actions rather than words. He and the Vatican stepped up to complex issues such as how to ensure that capitalism and economic growth are beneficial to all and how the world can best adapt to climate change. He visited migrant camps in Greece, prayed in a mosque in the Central African Republic amid a civil war, and was the first pope in recent history to publicly go to confession, embodying the humility he preached. He rejected extravagance, choosing to live in the Vatican guesthouse instead of the Apostolic Palace and driving a modest Fiat rather than a luxury car. His simplicity was not just symbolic, it reflected his belief in a Church that prioritizes people over power. Pope Francis viewed himself first as a pastor and spent much time listening to and speaking with people in the world and not just church leadership. Honest and candid, he did not shy away from the Church's most difficult questions, acknowledging unresolved issues rather than dismissing them. This transparency made him one of the most relatable and beloved popes in modern history. He was a man of faith, but also a man of the people – approachable, deeply empathetic, and unafraid to admit when the Church needed change. His legacy will endure as a testament to the power of unity, the necessity of dialogue, and the courage to lead with principle.



Dublin, Ireland, was chosen by Pope Francis to host the 9th World Meeting of Families in August 2018, guided by the theme "The Gospel of the Family: Joy for the World".

Held every three years, this major international event brings together families from across the world to celebrate, pray and reflect upon the central importance of marriage and the family as the cornerstone of our lives, of society and of the Church.

Immigration & Citizenship Support Services Program

What we do: The IPC's Immigration and Citizenship Program provides information and support to immigrants from Ireland and elsewhere including obtaining legal status, adjusting status, matters related to Green Card applications and renewals, visas, U.S. Citizenship eligibility, and applications for U.S. Citizenship. The IPC can also provide information about how to apply for Irish passports. Staff is available during normal business hours to help to answer questions related to these matters. Additionally, the IPC offers bi-monthly Legal Immigration Clinics where individuals can have a free and confidential phone conversation about their particular immigration situation with a volunteer immigration attorney.

Immigration News

REAL ID driver's license or REAL Mass ID



<u>A REAL ID is an enhanced version of a driver's</u> <u>license or Mass ID that meets the Federal Secu-</u> <u>rity Standard for IDs.</u>

Beginning May 7, 2025, individuals 18 and older will need a REAL ID driver's license or ID card (or another ID accepted by the TSA) to board domestic flights or enter certain federal facilities.

A Massachusetts REAL ID has a star in the top right corner. A standard driver's license or Mass ID is not accepted for federal purposes.

To get a REAL ID you must make an appointment for an in-person visit at an RMV Service Center or AAA branch (if you're a member). You also must present identity documents.

- 1. proving you're in the U.S. legally
- 2. proving your full 9-digit social security number
- 3. proving you live in Massachusetts

To get a license or ID card from the Registry of Motor Vehicles (RMV), you need to provide the registry with certain identification documents, which vary depending on which credential you want. All documents on this page are available in multiple languages.

If you are renewing a standard driver's license (Class D, Class M, or Class D/M) or Mass ID, you have the option of choosing **REAL ID**, which you will need beginning **May 7**, **2025** to board domestic flights or enter certain federal facilities if you don't have another ID accepted by the TSA.

Important: REAL ID documents **must** be originals and they can **not** be laminated. Your current name **must** match the one on your documents. If it does not, you **must** present documents proving you changed your name, like a marriage certificate or other court document.



Am I Eligible for Irish Citizenship?

What does it mean to be an Irish citizen?

European Union (EU). It gives you certain rights,

including the right to possess an Irish passport, live

and work in Ireland and the EU, and receive consular help from Irish embassies and consulates abroad.

Becoming an Irish citizen means that you are formally recognised as a national of Ireland and a citizen of the

Persons born on the island of Ireland before 1 January 2005 are automatically held to be Irish citizens. If you were born on the island of Ireland on or after 1 January 2005, your right to Irish citizenship depends on your parents' citizenship at the time of your birth and the residency history of your parents before your birth

Am I Eligible for Irish Citizenship?

If you were born outside of the island of Ireland

Parent born in Ireland:

You are automatically an Irish citizen if one of your parents was an Irish citizen who was born on the island of Ireland. in this case, you may apply immediately for an Irish passport, should you wish to do so.

Grandparent born in Ireland:



You can become an Irish citizen if one of your grandparents was an Irish citizen born on the island of Ireland. in this case, to obtain Irish citizenship, you must apply to be entered on the Foreign Birth Register. Once entered, you are an Irish citizen and, as such, entitled to apply for an Irish passport.



Parent on the Foreign Birth Register:

You can also become an Irish citizen if your parent was on the Foreign Birth Register at the time of your birth. in this case, you too can apply to be entered on the Register and, following that, apply for a passport.

Applications for Foreign Birth Registration are made online at ireland.ie/citizenship. In addition, submission of documentation confirming eligibility is required.

News From Ireland

Mayo pupils 'knock out a few tunes' to promote traditional music—RTE

ver 200 pupils from three primary schools in Co Mayo have come together to promote traditional Irish music as part of a two-year creative project. The event took place in Ballina under a Department of Education initiative. Applications for funding are open to all schools. The rousing performances are the result of hundreds of hours of hard work and practice. The pupils from Behy, Cooneal and Bonniconlon national schools, have been fine-tuning their musical skills and playing their hearts out to delighted families. Darragh Burke and Ultan Dempsey took up the accordion and it is fast becoming their favourite instrument.

Kerrygold has record breaking sales in the US

Ornua, Ireland's largest dairy exporter, achieved record-breaking sales of its Kerrygold brand in the U.S. in 2024, helped by the launch of a new 1lb butter block. Kerrygold reached more American households than ever and is now the second most popular butter brand in the U.S. CEO Conor Galvin highlighted the brand's global success, with over 12 million packs of Kerrygold butter and cheese sold weekly in 2024. Despite strong results, Ornua warned of uncertain trading conditions due to tariffs introduced by U.S. President Donald Trump. For the year ending December, turnover dipped slightly by 0.2% to ϵ 3.4 billion, while operating profits rose by 11.8% to ϵ 130.5 million. EBITDA also increased by 10.5% to ϵ 165.5 million.

Irish skies lit up in stunning display of Northern Lights— RTE.ie

The Northern Lights were visible across Ireland, with many people sharing photos of the atmospheric phenomenon on social media. A stunning display of pink and green illuminations lit up the night sky for parts of the country due to a 'Coronal Mass Ejection' from the Sun. Aurora displays occur when charged particles collide with gases in the Earth's atmosphere around the magnetic poles. In the northern hemisphere, most of this activity takes place within a band known as the aurora oval, covering latitudes between 60 and 75 degrees.

An Spidéal woodland becomes first reserve in Gaeltacht — RTE

More than 30 acres of native woodland in An Spidéal, Co Galway have been purchased by the Native Woodlands Trust. Coill Sheanadh Gharráin, on the eastern bank of the Both Loiscthe river, 2km north of the village will come under the trust's care. The site is considered an 'Atlantic temperate rainforest' within the Conamara bog complex conservation area and contains over 80 acres of heath, woodland and bogland. Many of the trees are thought to be 400 years old and the site appears on maps of the area from the early 1800s.

Crios Cords: Traditional Irish Woven Belts



Among the many symbols of Irish folk culture, the crios belt stands out as both a practical garment and a deeply symbolic item rooted in the rural traditions of the west of Ireland. Worn traditionally by men in the Gaeltacht regions—particularly in parts of Connemara, Donegal, and the Aran Islands—the crios is more than a woven woolen belt. It is a living piece of Irish heritage, interlacing utility, artistry, and identity.

The word crios (pronounced "kriss") simply means "belt" or "girdle" in Irish. The traditional crios is a hand-woven wool belt, typically measuring about two inches wide and several feet long, with fringed ends. Its most striking feature is its vibrant, multicolored striped pattern, often incorporating red, yellow, green, blue, black, and white. These colors are not just decorative; they reflect the skill and creativity of the weaver and sometimes carry personal or regional significance.

Criosanna were typically woven by women at home using simple looms or even with the belt anchored around a foot or chair leg. They were created for male family members—fathers, sons, or husbands—as part of the daily wardrobe, often worn with homespun trousers and shirts. The belt was wrapped around the waist and tied at the front or side, offering both function and flair.

The *crios* has its roots in the subsistence farming and fishing communities of western Ireland, where self-sufficiency was essential. In regions where contact with outside markets was limited and resources were scarce, clothes and accessories had to be homemade. Wool from native sheep was spun and dyed using local plants and minerals, then woven into items like shawls, skirts, and *criosanna*.

The *crios* served a clear functional purpose: it held up trousers and provided lower back support for men engaged in physically demanding labor. However, its importance extended beyond mere practicality. The process of weaving and gifting a *crios* carried emotional and familial value. A mother or sister making a *crios* for a son or brother was performing a quiet act of care, embedding warmth and protection into the threads.

In traditional Irish culture, the crios was not just a garment but also a symbol of continuity, family ties, and identity. The patterns and colors could distinguish a community or even a family. Much like Scottish tartans, these belts became personal markers, though without a strict codified system.

The crios was also associated with rites of passage. In some areas, it formed part of a young man's coming-of-age attire, signaling his transition into adult responsibilities. It was sometimes worn during weddings or passed down as an heirloom, making it a thread connecting generations.

Folklore further elevated the crios's meaning. It was believed that tying a crios around a person or object could offer protection. In some communities, the belt was wrapped around infants during baptisms or around cows to protect them from ill luck. Its colorful bands were seen as a ward against the "evil eye" or misfortune.

Cork Take first league title in almost three decades

Full-time score - Cork 3-24 | Tipperary 0-23

The Rebels have done it - beating out Tipperary in an excellent display at Páirc Uí Chaoimh to claim their first League title in 27 years. Both sides gave their all - but it was clear the Rebels were taking no prisoners in today's final after wrapping up the first half 3-16 to 0-12, with goals from Ethan Twomey, Alan Connolly and Darragh Fitzgibbon. And there was little change in the second half, with Cork setting the pace and Tipp holding on as hard as they could with a few good points, but not nearly enough to turn the tides. Pat Horgan also became the leading scorer in the National League going past Eddie Keher's record.

Katie Taylor – Amanda Serrano trilogy confirmed— Joe.ie

The much-anticipated trilogy fight between Katie Taylor and Amanda Serrano will take place at Madison Square Garden on Friday, July 11, over ten three-minute rounds. The iconic New York venue played host to the first bout between the two greats, which was the first female fight to headline the MSG and was won by Taylor on split decision. Their second fight, last November at the AT&T Stadium, was the co-main event alongside Mike Tyson vs Jake Paul, and was a unanimous decision win for the Bray native.July's fight will be part of the first-ever all women's professional boxing card at the MSG, and will be shown live on Netflix.

Rory McIlroy Captures Long-Awaited Masters Title

Rory McIlroy made history at the 2025 Masters Tournament, clinching his first Green Jacket and completing the career Grand Slam. This victory marked his 11th attempt to win Augusta National, making him the sixth player—and the first European—to achieve this feat . The final round was a rollercoaster, with McIlroy opening with a double bogey and facing setbacks on the back nine. However, he forced a playoff with Justin Rose after a bogey on the 72nd hole. In the playoff, McIlroy redeemed himself with a precise wedge shot to four feet, converting the birdie to secure the win .This triumph ended an 11-year major championship drought for McIlroy and solidified his place among golf's elite.

Dylan Slevin secures victory over world champion Luke Littler

Tipperary's Dylan Slevin recorded one of the best wins of his career by defeating world champion Luke Littler 6-3 in the first round of Players Championship 11. The 22-year-old from Borrisokane impressed with a 92.74 average, outperforming Littler, who averaged 90.11, at the tournament in Leicester. This victory adds to Slevin's growing reputation, having recently beaten 2021 world champion Gerwyn Price in his strong run of form. Slevin's win over Littler marks another milestone in his rise through the darts ranks, showcasing his talent on a global stage.
