

### What am I doing for Lent?

We enter the season of Lent by putting ashes on our foreheads. What's symbolized here? Perhaps the heart understands better than the head because more people go to church on Ash Wednesday than on any other day of the year, including Christmas. The queues



to receive the ashes in many churches are endless. Why? Why are the ashes so popular? Their popularity, I suspect, comes from the fact that, as a symbol, ashes are blunt, primal, archetypal, and speak the language of the soul.





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### COCOUNITY SPOTLIGHT: Peter O'Coalley

If you know Peter O'Malley, you've likely seen a man who knows how to keep moving, whether it's running marathons, working out, or making his rounds across Dorchester and Southie. At 70, Peter's life is a testament to the power of perseverance, community, and grit.

For those of us in recovery, we hear the word "trudge" often. It is not glamorous, but it's real. It's the slow, steady push forward through mud, sand, and whatever else life throws in your way. My father has embodied that journey, showing those of us who need a power of example exactly how it's done.

Peter's story begins in 1955 in the Gaelic-speaking region of Roskeeda, Rosmuc, County Galway, Ireland. Born into a small farmhouse as the only boy among seven siblings, he grew up in a world of resilience, sharing cramped quarters without indoor plumbing.

When he came to America, speaking mostly his native Gaelic and barely knowing English, he was just another young Irish immigrant searching for his place. But much like the countless immigrant families who settled in Boston, Peter found strength in his community. He joined his sister Mary and her husband John Walsh, whose family helped establish Laborers' Local 223 to lift up new arrivals and provide opportunities. The Walsh Family – Pat and his siblings – were true giants, building a foundation for working-class families to rise into the middle class. My father benefitted from that legacy, joining the union himself, securing job stability, and building a life where he could support a family, send us to parochial schools, and provide opportunities that wouldn't have been possible otherwise. Today, the Walsh Family legacy continues with the third generation now in leadership positions throughout the Boston Building Trades and beyond.

Family connections run deep for us all. My father is not only the proud uncle of Marty Walsh, but he has also been a constant presence in the lives of all his nephews, nieces, and countless godchildren. Marty, as many of you know, went on to become the Mayor of Boston, U.S. Secretary of Labor, and now the Executive Director of the NHL Players Association. Long before that, he was just another nephew who battled life threatening cancer, being shot, and alcoholism. A nephew that could count on his uncle for unconditional love and support. My father's steadfast commitment to family mirrors his larger role in the community, where he's always been a pillar of support – the kind of guy you can count on, no matter what.

That doesn't mean it was easy. Life has a way of testing us. My father survived a devastating accident in a paper mill that cost him all the toes on his right foot, yet he refused to let it define him. Doctors said he wouldn't walk again, but Peter said otherwise – and went on to run marathons, some sub-3:10:00.

It's that time of the year again. The time when you decide to change all your "bad" habits at once. No more cookies, ice-cream, or candy in between meals. No more shopping for clothes you don't need. You are going to give up smoking or try to drink less. No more...no more...no more...!! You pledge to be the healthiest, most efficient person around. Here we are, already in February, another year that somehow you haven't managed to be as slim, smoke-free, or perfect as your plan had called for. You take a kind of comfort in this, throw up your hands and say, "what's the point

anyway?" You swallow the guilt, throw away the list and pledge to try again next year. Some of us are able to replay this routine year after year.

For others, however, where alcohol or other substances are a problem, the danger is that there may not be a next year. Are you concerned about the way you used alcohol or drugs over Christmas and the New Year? Does it feel like the party is continuing but no one around you is smiling? Perhaps you are sick and tired of cleaning up the mess of a loved one, someone with a drinking or drug problem. Maybe you just want some support in dealing with your partner /brother/ sister/ parent's drinking or drug use?

Unfortunately Stigma stops many people from being able to reach out for help, because they believe people will judge them for not being able to make the changes they want. The truth is a human being's ability to make changes is not as simple as "just say no" or "just quit". A recent article is the Boston Globe \* illustrates just how complex change is and how one tool, a medication like Wegovy, appears to help reduce the cravings for a variety of substances and behaviors that people have historically struggled with alone. Food, alcohol, drugs, gambling and even shopping compulsions appear to have a biological base that could unlock some of the question "why can't I change".

The first step, however, is reaching out; without fear of stigma or judgement. Reach out to a friend, your doctor, or a trusted community member. We here at the IPC are happy to help if we can. We are in the process of planning some community workshops addressing similar issues like smoking cessation, substance use disorder education and family support groups.

What we do: The IPC's Immigration and Citizenship Program provides information and support to immigrants from Ireland and elsewhere including obtaining legal status, adjusting status, matters related to Green Card applications and renewals, visas, U.S. Citizenship eligibility, and applications for U.S. Citizenship. The IPC can also provide information about how to apply for Irish passports. Staff is available during normal business hours to help to answer questions related to these matters. Additionally, the IPC offers bi-monthly Legal Immigration Clinics where individuals can have a free and confidential phone conversation about their particular immigration situation with a volunteer immigration attorney.

### Applying for an Irish passport?

Here's some advice from the Consulate General:



### Before submitting a passport application, DOUBLE CHECK



#### Renew online

If you are over 18, you can apply to renew your passport online 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The service is fast, convenient, and secure. Processing takes about 10 working days - for details, visit ireland.ie/passports

#### **Original Certified Documents**



Consult ireland.ie/passports to ensure that you include original documents with your application. If you are a first time applicant, make sure to include a notarised copy of a valid photo ID as well as 2 original documents showing proof of your name and address. If your citizenship is based on having a parent born in Ireland, make sure to include an original certified copy of their Birth Certificate and/or Marriage Certificate, if applicable. These can often be found at hse.ie. If you are a citizen through Foreign Birth Registration (FBR), make sure to include your FBR certificate.

### Am I Eligible for Irish Citizenship?

### What does it mean to be an Irish citizen?



Becoming an Irish citizen means that you are formally recognised as a national of Ireland and a citizen of the European Union (EU). It gives you certain rights, including the right to possess an Irish passport, live and work in Ireland and the EU, and receive consular help from Irish embassies and consulates abroad.



#### Who is eligible to be an Irish citizen?

You may be an Irish citizen (or entitled to citizenship) based on when and where you, your parents, or your grandparents were born.

#### If you were born on the island of Ireland



Persons born on the island of Ireland before 1 January 2005 are automatically held to be Irish citizens. If you were born on the island of Ireland on or after 1 January 2005, your right to Irish citizenship depends on your parents' citizenship at the time of your birth and the residency history of your parents before your birth

### Am I eligible?



You can apply for an Irish passport if you are an Irish citizen. You are automatically an Irish citizen if you or a parent were born on the island of Ireland. If you have a grandparent who was born on the island of Ireland, you are eligible to apply for Irish citizenship. HOWEVER, you must apply and obtain citizenship before applying for a passport.

#### Photo guidelines



Check the photograph guidelines on our website carefully. You can take a digital photo on a smartphone or tablet or get one from a photo shop and have it emailed to you. For details, visit ireland.ie/dfa/passports/photo-guidelines

#### If you're travelling & have lost your passport

**Emergency Travel Certificates can be issued but only** in strictly emergency situations such as the death of a family member abroad. Applicants will need to produce written proof of the emergency situation

### Am I Eligible for Irish Citizenship?

If you were born outside of the island of Ireland



### Parent born in Ireland:

You are automatically an Irish citizen if one of your parents was an Irish citizen who was born on the island of Ireland. in this case, you may apply immediately for an Irish passport, should you wish to do so.



#### Grandparent born in Ireland:

You can become an Irish citizen if one of your grandparents was an Irish citizen born on the island of Ireland. in this case, to obtain Irish citizenship, you must apply to be entered on the Foreign Birth Register. Once entered, you are an Irish citizen and, as such, entitled to apply for an Irish passport.



#### Parent on the Foreign Birth Register:

You can also become an Irish citizen if your parent was on the Foreign Birth Register at the time of your birth. in this case, you too can apply to be entered on the Register and, following that, apply for a passport.



### Limerick Gardaí Use Tractor to Save The Day

When Garda John Clifford, based in Murroe, Co. Limerick heard that a couple living up in the Reenavanna Hills required assistance. The snow made the road impassable to most and certainly to all by car. In trying to figure out a solution, Garda Clifford remembered that a Garda colleague based in the nearby village, Doon had a fine red tractor so he gave him a quick buzz. Without hesitation, Garda Clifford agreed to tip over to Doon to collect the medication in the pharmacy while Garda Fitzgerald, who was off-duty, got the tractor's engine going. Garda Mike Fitzgerald played county for Limerick during the late 2000s so he knows all about the value of team work. The pair of them took off up the hills in the tractor and dropped off the prescriptions as needed.



Speed limits on many Irish roads are set to be reduced by 20 km/h on February 7th, in a move aimed at eliminating the most common types of road accidents. Default speed limits on rural local roads will decrease by 25% from 80km/h to 60km/h and new speed limit signs will replace existing ones to reflect this change. The speed limit in urban cores (which include built up areas as well as housing estates and town centres) will be reduced to 30km/h from the current 50km/h limit. The speed limit on national secondary roads will also decrease from 100km/h to 80km/h. In the period between 2006 and 2021, there was a strong downwards trend in fatalities - from 365 fatalities in 2006 to 132 in 2021.



Cork singer-songwriter Cian Ducrot has said he is "so blessed and grateful" to win his first Grammy Award for songwriting, after co-writing SZA's hit track Saturn, which was named Best R&B Song at the 2025 ceremony in Los Angeles. The musician received the RTÉ Choice Music Prize for Irish Song of the Year with his track Heaven and has since played a series of high-profile concerts in Ireland and abroad. This spring he is set to play a string of sold-out dates across Europe, including two nights at Dublin's 3Arena. He will return to Cork for a massive homecoming gig at Live at the Marquee on 19 July.

### Rural Doolin Restaurant Awarded First Michelin Star

A restaurant in a small village in County Clare has been awarded its first Michelin Star. Homestead Cottage. Homestead Cottage is located at Lough North, Doolin, and is run by Robbie and Sophie McCauley. Homestead Cottage was described by inspectors as the most rural of the newly awarded restaurants and it was praised for both its character and excellent quality ingredients. The Michelin Guide website reads it offers "Modern Cuisine" as the inspectors explained: "On Ireland's west coast, we have what is surely the most rural of the newly anointed Stars. Run by Robbie and Sophie McCauley, who met while working at Gregan's Castle, Homestead Cottage in Doolin is a thoroughly charming place.

### **Irelands Dry Stone Walls**



An ancient and enduring method of construction in Ireland, has recently been added to the prestigious UNESCO list of protected cultural heritage practices. This marks the fifth Irish cultural practice to be recognized, following hurling, uilleann piping, Irish harping, and Irish falconry. Dry stone walls are a common feature across rural Ireland, with examples dating back thousands of years. The oldest known dry stone walls in Ireland, located in the Céide fields of Co Mayo, are approximately 5,800 years old. There are over 400,000 kilometers of dry stone walls throughout Ireland, especially in the east of the country.

Dry stone construction involves building structures without using mortar, relying on the precise placement of stones to form stable and durable walls. The materials used for these walls are typically locally sourced stones, most commonly limestone in Ireland. This building method has been applied to create various structures, including walls, bridges, arches, tombs, beehive huts, oratories, and fortifications. The craft of dry stone construction is considered a vernacular skill, passed down through generations. It is deeply embedded in Irish culture and has long been a practice among farmers, masons, and sculptors.

The practice of dry stone walling began with simple field boundaries and evolved over time, leading to more complex structures such as corbelled arches seen in the ancient Passage Tombs. Dry stone construction was crucial to the early development of Irish culture, contributing to the creation of sheltered living spaces, areas for livestock, and spaces for growing crops. These structures also played an important role in community life, serving as locations for social gatherings, feasts, and trade. The cooperative labor system known as Meitheal was essential to this process, as communities would come together to build or repair walls. Meitheal encouraged intergenerational cooperation, where younger members would learn from older generations, ensuring the continuity of the craft.

Dry stone walls also had symbolic significance in Irish culture. Stone is seen as a material representing permanence and timelessness, making it the ideal material for honoring the dead, creating safe living spaces, and constructing sacred sites. Over the centuries, dry stone walls gave rise to more elaborate structures, such as Court Tombs and Passage Tombs during the Stone Age, and Beehive Huts, Wedge Tombs, and Dolmens in the Bronze Age. In the Iron Age, large dry stone forts like Staigue, Lough A Dun, and Doon Mor were constructed. Early Christian monastic sites, including Skellig Michael and Gallarus Oratory, were also built using dry stone techniques.

In the 19th century, the majority of the dry stone walls seen across Ireland today were constructed, often by farmers and wallers commissioned by landlords during periods of land changes or times of famine. Dry stone walling became a key part of farming life, helping to maintain field boundaries, protect livestock, and support crop cultivation. It also had ecological benefits by maintaining biodiversity. While traditionally a solitary activity for farmers, dry stone walling was also a communal endeavor, with neighbors and communities helping each other to clear stones from fields and repair walls.

Today, dry stone walling is experiencing a revival, thanks to the efforts of community groups, farmers, and heritage professionals who recognize the cultural and historical importance of the craft. The Dry Stone Wall Association of Ireland (DSWAI), founded in 2009, has played a leading role in promoting the preservation of Ireland's dry stone building heritage. Through workshops and events, DSWAI raises awareness about the craft and emphasizes its continued relevance in modern Irish life. Despite these efforts, dry stone walls and landscapes remain vulnerable to the pressures of modern farming practices and environmental changes. While some dry stone structures are protected by legislation such as the National Monument Acts and Planning Acts, many others still lack sufficient safeguarding.

The inclusion of dry stone walling on the UNESCO cultural heritage list ensures the recognition of its importance to Irish identity and history. As interest in the craft grows, the hope is that future generations will continue to appreciate and maintain this vital tradition, ensuring that Ireland's dry stone landscapes remain an integral part of its cultural heritage for years to come.

### St Patrick: A Fourth Century Prodigal Son

- He was born about 389 A.D. in a family of Celtic Christians.
- Patrick rejected his family's Christian faith and had no desire for God.
- When he was about 15 a marauding gang of pirates kidnapped him, took him to Ireland, and forced him into slavery.
- He served his Irish master as a shepherd.
   His education was interrupted. For the rest of his life he was self-conscious about his lack of education and eloquence.
- During his captivity he had a profound conversion experience that changed the course of his whole life. (See Excerpt from his Confession below)
- He was able to escape after six years and return to his homeland and parents.

### From Patrick's Confession

I was sixteen years old and knew not the true God and was carried away captive; but in tbat strange land (Irekund) the Lord opened my unbelieving eyes, and although late I called my sins to mind, and was converted with my whole beart to the Lord my God, who regarded my low estate, but pity on my youth and ignorance, and consoled me as a father consoles bis children...Well every day I used to look after sheep and I used to pray often during the day, the love of God and fear of bim increased more and more in me and my faith began to grow and my spirit stirred up, so that in one day I would pray as many as a bundred times and nearly as many at night. Even when I was staying out in the woods or on the mountain, I used to rise before dawn for prayer, in snow and frost and rain, and I felt no ill effect and there was no slackness in me. As I now realize, it was because the Spirit was glowing in me.

- Then one night Patrick had a vision: I saw a man named Victorious, coming as if from Ireland, with innumerable letters; and...I read...'The voice of the Irish' and while I was reading...I heard the voice...'Please, boly boy, come and walk with us again.'
- Against his parent's wishes he returned to Ireland to bring the Gospel of Christ.
- He spent some thirty years there and evangelized and baptized many thousands, some estimate over one hundred thousand. He lost count. Some two hundred churches were established. His ministry confronted and challenged pagan practices there such as infants sacrificed to harvest gods, prisoners of war sacrificed and their skulls used as ceremonial drinking bowls.
- He also spoke out unequivocally against human slavery, and some say he was the first to do so.
- Patrick often annoyed his church members in Ireland because he would return their gifts and the jewelry they wanted to give him.
- His work through his successors brought a shining light to the so called "Dark Ages."
- For those of you who think St. Patrick belongs only to the Irish Catholics, you should know that Patrick himself was neither Irish nor Roman Catholic. He was a Briton by birth. And he was part of Celtic Christianity which in his day was independent from Rome. As you will see from the piece on page four, there is a sense in which Patrick really belongs to all of us.



### Limerick hurlers appoint new captain and vice-captain for the 2025 Season—Joe.ie

Ahead of their 2025 National League campaign, 29-year-old Cian Lynch has been named as the new captain of the Limerick hurling team, with William O'Donoghue as vice-captain. The 2021 Hurler of the Year replaces Declan Hannon, who has captained Limerick to five All-Ireland titles, including four in a row from 2020 to 2023. In a statement Limerick said "Declan has led the group by example in everything he did on and off the pitch. He has been a wonderful example to those around him and a great support to all players and the management team throughout his time as captain."



#### Dublin to host Ireland's first NFL regular season game

Dublin's Croke Park stadium is to host Ireland's first regular season National Football League (NFL) game. The Pittsburgh Steelers were announced as the designated home team for the Dublin game, which is to be held at the end of September. "I'm honoured to confirm that in 2025 the NFL will play an historic, first-ever regular season game in Dublin, Ireland," NFL executive vice president Peter O'Reilly said. "The first regular season game in Ireland will be played at the iconic, historic and magnificent Croke Park stadium, home to the Gaelic Athletic Association, the GAA, and host to many tremendous sporting events and moments over the years.



### Six Nations: Ireland beat Scotland to keep Grand Slam alive—ESPN

Ireland put on a superb display as they dominated Scotland in a 32-18 victory to stay perfect in this year's Six Nations, adding fuel to their bid for an unprecedented third straight title. Tries from Calvin Nash, captain Caelan Doris, James Lowe and Jack Conan plus 12 points off the boot of rookie fly-half Sam Prendergast saw Ireland to victory and left them as the only unbeaten team after the opening two rounds of the tournament. Ireland, seeking to become the first team to win three successive Six Nations titles outright, further stretched their lead in the 70th minute as 21-year-old Prendergast put over his second penalty to add to three conversions.



#### Dublin awaits as NFL announces 2025 Dates-RTE

The Galway native had surgery on his brain a week ago. Irish boxer John Cooney has died a week after his Celtic super-featherweight title fight at the Ulster Hall in Belfast. Cooney was stopped in the ninth round of his fight against Welshman Nathan Howells on February 1 and was taken to hospital, where he underwent surgery on a brain bleed and was admitted to intensive care. Cooney became the Celtic super-featherweight champion with a first-round victory over Liam Gaynor in Dublin in November 2023, part of the same sell-out show that saw Katie Taylor defeat Chantelle Cameron by majority decision.
