News From Our Senior Ourreach

New Changes to the Medicare Savings Program

As of March 1st, the Medicare Savings Program (aka the Buy-in) no longer has an asset limit. This means that many more people may be eligible to get on these programs that help to pay the Medicare Part B premium (\$175 for most people taken out of social security) and get discounted drug coverage.

Depending on your income, MSP will pay for your Medicare Part A & B premiums and cost sharing, or Medicare Part B premium, as well as lower your prescription costs. This is not an insurance plan.



A Moment to Mind Yourself



Gambling: When and how to get support By Danielle Owen

"Even as I approach the gambling hall, as soon as I hear, two rooms away, the jingle of money poured out on the table, I almost go into convulsions." – Fyodor Dostoevsky

In the same way people can misuse drugs, alcohol, food, and sex, leading to major abuse and addiction, gambling misuse can also lead to addiction. The Massachusetts Council on Gaming and Health shares the following statistics on their website: "Research has estimated that ... approximately 2-3 percent of [Massachusetts]'s population has experienced disordered gambling in their lifetimes."

Problem gambling (sometimes referred to as "gambling addiction" or "gambling disorder") is gambling behavior that is damaging to a person or their family, often disrupting their daily life and career. Anyone who gambles can be at-risk for developing a gambling problem. Gambling disorder is a recognized mental health diagnosis.

Compulsive gambling can result in social, emotional, and financial devastation, including loss of relationships, homes, emotional or physical health, and career or educational opportunities.

We at the IPC have seen how pathological gambling (in its most serious form) can lead to stress, depression, anxiety, substance abuse, and even suicide. With that in mind, it's vital to share the key signs and what support is available for those living with this addiction.

Some warning signs of a gambling problem:

- Thinking about gambling all the time.
- Feeling the need to bet more money and more often.
- Going back to try to win your money back ("chasing losses").

- Feeling restless or irritable when trying to stop or cut down.
- Feeling like you can't control yourself.
- Gambling despite negative consequences.

No one plans to have a problem with gambling but ask yourself the following:

- Have you ever borrowed money to gamble or to cover lost money?
- Have you ever thought you might have a gambling problem, or been told that you might?
- Have you ever been untruthful about the extent of your gambling, or hid betting slips, lottery tickets, gambling money or other signs of betting from others?
- Have you ever tried to stop or cut back on how much or how often you gamble?

Change is always possible but sometimes we need extra support including planning for and managing urges. New Irish Language Initiative Launches-Gaelige.ie

Foras na Gaeilge and RTÉ presented Creidim Ionat, an innovative and collaborative online initiative aimed at nurturing widespread awareness and everyday use of Irish. Creidim Ionat is a Foras na Gaeilge initiative in partnership with RTÉ that calls on everyone with an interest in Irish to pick a language goal to work towards, with the help of a mentor and the wide range of resources that are available to help. A memorial garden dedicated to the Ballycannon Boys who lost their lives during the struggle for Irish freedom has been officially opened in Kerry Pike. Chair of the Clogheen/Kerry Pike Community Association, Iain McGregor, said it had taken two years and "a lot of work" to complete the memorial garden which includes three metal plaques detailing some of the history of the Ballycannon Boys and six trees planted to honour each of the six young men. The Ballycannon Boys, members of the C Company, First Battalion, Cork No 1 Brigade, IRA, comprised Daniel Crowley (23), William Deasy (20), Thomas Dennehy (21), Daniel Murphy (24), Jeremiah O'Mullane (23) and Michael O'Sullivan (20). The memorial garden faces onto the house and farmyard which in 1921 was the location at which the Ballycannon Boys spent their last night alive.

Letterkenny Students Create Magical Fairy Garden for Community—Donegal Daily

Students from a Letterkenny school have created a 'fairytale' ending for local children after creating the town's first fairy garden in a local park. Errigal College decided they wanted to give a little back to the community and so they created the magical garden nestled within the confines of the secret garden area of Bernard McGlinchey Town Park.This enchanting addition to the local community promises to bring joy and wonder to visitors of all ages. In collaboration with Ms. Crossan's Transition Year art students, who lent their imaginative flair to ensure that every detail sparkles with magic. "This fairy garden represents the culmination of the students' hard work and creativity," remarked Mr. Paul Kelly, woodwork teacher at Errigal College.

First Irish Born Actor Wins Oscar for 'Best Actor'

History was made this year as Corkman Cillian Murphy is officially the first Irish-born actor to win Best Actor in the Academy's 96-year history for his performance in the film 'Oppenheimer.' Communicy Spoclight: Wichael Flynn



IPC's Róisín Lee received a letter from her Grand Uncle, Michael Flynn who is also from Kilkerrin in Co. Galway. In the 1950's, Michael served as Vice - Consul of Ireland in Boston. In part of his letter, he reflects on the years he spent there and what life was like for Irish Immigrants in Boston at that time.

There was no such centre in Boston when I arrived in the 1950's decade.

The 1950's were a decade of depression in the Irish economy with high emigration to America. It was also a time of recession in the United States. I found my work in the Consulate rewarding as it gave me the opportunity of attending the social functions of many counties and gaining insights into the lives of so many immigrants. I used to receive letters from Bina (my sister) giving me the addresses of people from Kilkerrin parish living in Dorchester and the greater Boston area. I enjoyed having dinner with them in their hospitable homes as we recalled events of our lives at home.

The Consulate was located on the 22nd floor of the John Hancock building near Copley Square. I lived in a apartment near Beacon Street close by, and near to the Boston Public Garden. In the consulate, we kept in close touch with the Irish community by attending social events of the various county associations. I frequently gave lectures at functions organized by social groups in various parishes in greater Boston. I gave a lecture on the history of the Abbey Theatre to the Eire Society of Boston which was just founded at the time. I recall meeting Congressman John F. Kennedy, as he then was, at a social function of the Galway association. That was the year he won election as United States Senator for Massachusetts. During those pre-Vatican Council years, Archbishop Cushing was ahead of his time in taking initiatives in church affairs.

In the 1950's, letters were the means of communication with home. I treasured letters from Bina and my sisters with news from home. In those years we felt the need of a Pastoral Centre and I am happy to read that your centre is now a vibrant, welcoming organization in the Irish community.

FADÓ FADÓ – LONG AGO IN IRELAND



The curious Irish town that legend says has magical healing powers By Alana Loftus, The Irish Star.com

The tiny town of Feakle in Co Clare is no different to any other rural Irish town from the outside. But under the surface, the town has a long history of mythology, magic, and healing.


Besides its vibrant traditional music scene, Feakle is perhaps best known as the hometown of Biddy Early - the great Irish healer and suspected witch of the 19th century. Before she was well known, she was a poor girl named Bridget O'Connor from rural Co Clare. She learned everything she knew about herbal medicine from her mother who passed away young.

In early 1800s Ireland, Piseogs were prevalent and people believed that curses from dark forces could derail their lives. Spéirbhean of 'bean feasa', was the name given to a local woman who would be employed to help lift these curses. As the hometown of one of the most famous and powerful Spéirbheans, Feakle became associated with magic.

In 1843 J.G Kohl, a German writer touring the area, wrote that a number of 'wise women' lived in the area. He described them as 'Norisheen', a clairvoyant and soothsayer who told of the interests of the country, 'Consideen' from Edenvale, who claimed to know death personally and the hour of her own death, and 'Crohoor Highue' who could 'charm the very birds from the trees.' While today we find it fascinating to learn about the women with 'magic powers,' many women including Biddy Early were accused of witchcraft, ostracized from society and even charged with crimes. The town of Feakle rejected the idea that it was somehow magical.


Today, there is little evidence that the town has any magical powers but remnants of the stories remain in local legends. Visitors to the town can even pay a visit to Biddy Early's house, and leave a coin there for good luck.

Feakle still has a diverse and interesting community with many healers, craftspeople, artists, homesteaders and organic farmers. Because of its tranquil and beautiful scenery, it is a popular spot with creative people. If you are looking for an underrated town to visit this summer there is plenty to do from walking trails and water sports to yoga retreats and the local woolen mills.


And in August... the barley grew up out of our grave.



Ireland Celebrate another Six Nations Title

Ireland claimed a nervy 17-13 victory over Scotland in Dublin to seal back-to-back Six Nations titles. Ireland saw their grand slam dreams crushed by England last week but quickly bounced back to win the championship, although they were made to work hard for the win. Andy Farrell's men only needed to avoid defeat to guarantee that they would be lifting the trophy at the Aviva Stadium and they led 7-6 at half-time thanks to Dan Sheehan's try following an overthrown lineout. They then roared out of the blocks in the second half and moved 17-6 ahead with Andrew Porter's try, meaning Huw Jones's late score was only a consolation for the Scots and the hosts saw the game out to spark celebrations at the Aviva Stadium.

Clare beat Tipperary to reach Hurling League final - *The Irish Times*

Clare have a few ghosts to slay in the coming weeks. Over the past few years, while they've been the team most likely to put it up to Limerick (at least in the Munster championship) they've been curiously spooked by the sight of Kilkenny in the All-Ireland series. They have their chance to put that some way right in the league final after they cleaned the clocks of a lacklustre Tipperary side in Portlaoise. With first-half substitute Aidan McCarthy virtually flawless from frees and player of the league David Fitzgerald in rampant form through the middle, Clare ran up a 1-24 to 2-13 victory to give themselves a chance of a first league title since 2016.

Offally Teen joins F3 grid, aiming for Formula 1

18 year old Alex Dunne graduated to the Formula 3 grid in 2024 with MP Motorsport. Dunne won the British Formula 4 title in 2022 and was runner-up as a rookie in the GB3 Championship last year. He topped the Formula 3 test at Imola in October and finished on the podium in his first race in the category at Macau in November. "I'm thrilled to start my first full season of FIA F3 with MP Motorsport", said Dunne. "They are proven winners in every category that they compete in, and I'm sure that they will use their experience to help me build on my initial experiences with the F3 car in the post-season FIA F3 test at Imola and then at Macau.

Irish crews confirmed for World Rowing Cup event in Italy—RTE.ie

Ireland have named their rowing team for the World Cup I event in Italy next month, as preparations go up a gear for the summer's Paris Games. The World Rowing Cups are an annual series of three regattas lead in to the World Rowing Championships. World Rowing Championships bronze medallists Philip Doyle and Daire Lynch compete in the men's double, with Nathan Timoney and Ross Corrigan - who also won bronze at last September's Worlds - combining in the men's pair. In the women's pair Fiona Murtagh and Aifric Keogh combine. They were part of the women's four crew that claimed bronze at the Tokyo Olympics.





History Made As ESPN Broadcasts Gaelic Games For First Time Ever To US Audience

History was made on St Patrick's Day 2024 over Stateside as the National Collegiate GAA - or NCGAA for short - had their hurling and football finals televised on ESPN for the first time ever. It was the first GAA match to be televised nationally in the US since the 1973 All-Ireland final. Purdue University overcame Colorado University at Zion Bank Stadium in Salt Lake City, Colorado to win the hurling final. Notre Dame won the football final. Zion Bank Stadium should go down as one of the most picturesque venues in GAA with the amazing view of the Rocky Mountains coupled with the clear blue skies on the day it painted a perfect scene for hurling. The NCGAA hurling final was broadcasted live on ESPN 3 for the first time ever and according to the NCGAA's GoFundMe they organised to cover expenses, they have the opportunity to broadcast yearly finals on ESPN for the foreseeable future in what is huge news for the expansion of GAA in America.
