GUIDE TO BOSTON

Boston is a great city to spend the Summer. With beautiful weather and close proximity to beaches you are guaranteed the Summer of a lifetime.

GUIDE TO BOSTON CONTD.

- Boston is home to many of the best sports teams in the USA. If you get a chance you should take a game in. Red Sox play through the Summer and The Patriots pre-season begins at the end of Summer.
- There are lots of great Summer and vacation spots close by some accessible by ferry and bus but worth the trip. Some examples of beautiful places include:

 - Cape Cod any area (Marthas Vineyard and Nantucket are off the Cape)

 and hosts many events and concerts.



HOUSING

Student summer housing is the best option for J1 students, while these may seem expensive they do come furnished, pricing and applications are available at the below links:

If you decide not to pursue the College Summer Housing route: beware of SCAMS! It can be quite hard to detect scams. We would NOT recommend sending money 'site unseen'.

Accommodation is quite expensive and most apartments are unfurnished; sublets are ideally suited to those who are only planning on staying short term in the City. A one bed in Boston starts at around \$1,200+

- Renting in Boston means you rent the space only you need to furnish it yourself!
- Bring some bed linen with you sleeping bags and air-pillows
- Ask area realtors if they charge a fee when renting an apartment
- You will most likely need the first month rent, last month and at times a security deposit which can be 50% of the rent or an entire month!
- As you may be unfamiliar with an area, it might be worth calling the local police station to find out specific details on a particular street.

EMPLOYMENT

- Minimum wage in Boston is \$15 per hour (depending on size of business). Tipped employees (servers/bartenders) must be paid a minimum of \$6.75 per hour.
- The employment you receive must be seasonal or temporary.
- Areas in Boston that offer many seasonal jobs: Seaport, Boston Harbor, Marina Bay (Quincy), Cape Cod (1.5 hours outside Boston)
- You must contact your sponsoring agency if you want to change employment.
 Your J1 Visa status is tied to your employment, any unauthorised employment changes may result in Visa termination.
- There are federal laws in place in the US prohibiting discrimination in the workplace. If you feel that you have been a victim of discrimination in the workplace please contact your sponsor and the US Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.
- A well formatted resume may be a great help in your job search.
- A social security number is required when working on the J1 visa. Employers can hire you before you have been issued your social security number as long as you have evidence you have applied for one and have a legal right to work in the US. You need to apply at your local Social Security Office when you find somewhere to reside in Boston. Here is the link to SSO Locations.
- IPC is not affiliated with any employers.



SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER

- Within one week of arrival, please contact your sponsor to activate your visa on SEVIS. If your sponsor does not receive this information within the first few weeks of your arrival, your visa will automatically end.
- Once your sponsor validates your visa, it can take 2 4 days to become active on SEVIS, so please allow sufficient time before visiting your local Social Security Office, if you need to obtain a Social Security number, or need your card replaced. Note: your SEVIS record must be updated prior to applying for a Social Security number.

Applying for a Social Security Number:

- 1. You will need to bring your passport, DS-2019, and I-94 record. To obtain your I-94 record: click here & choose the option "Get Most Recent I-94."
- 2. You must apply for a Social Security number, or replacement card, in person. Please expect to wait 4-6 weeks for the card.
- 3. For more information on applying, and to locate the closest Social Security office, go to: https://www.ssa.gov/number-card/request-number-first-time or scan the QR CODE on the following page.
- Do not carry around your Social Security card in your wallet or purse. Keep this at home in a safe place. Keep your number confidential.
- Do not alter your social security card under any circumstances. This includes lamination.
- ** KEEP YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY CARD EVEN AFTER YOU LEAVE THE US. YOU
 WILL NEED THIS WHEN FILING A TAX RETURN OR IF YOU RETURN ON ANOTHER
 WORKING VISA SUCH AS THE J1 GRADUATE VISA **

VISA REQUIREMENTS

- Be sure to keep in touch with your sponsoring agency and notify them of your arrival in the US. Do not forget that you must check in with your Sponsor every 30 days to keep your visa active.
- You must let your sponsor know about any change of address so that they can notify SEVIS.
- You must get approval from your sponsor before traveling outside of the US while on a J1 SWT visa. Failure to do so may prevent you from re-entering the US.

DO NOT OVERSTAY YOUR VISA

- You should make every effort to look after your passport and keep it in a safe place. If your passport is LOST or STOLEN, please contact the Irish Consulate immediately.
- Scan or take a picture of the photo page of your passport, your visa, and your DS-2019 so that you will have a spare copy if you need it.
- We recommend that each J1 participant apply for an Irish Passport Card prior to their stay in Boston. A Passport Card is easily kept in your wallet and will allow you to keep your passport is a safe place when you are out and about.

We recommend <u>Rockland Trust</u> or <u>Citizens Bank</u> for your banking needs. You will need the following to open a bank account:

PROTECT YOUR PASSPORTS

- Getting replacement travel documentation can take time and will add to your expenses so make sure you keep your passport safe at all times and try not to carry it in public.
- Bring alternative photo identification with you, such as a driving license or a passport card, and keep photocopies of the identification page of your passport in a secure place in case you have to apply for a replacement.
- Note that the majority of bars/ nightclubs in Boston do not accept European
 Passport Cards or Irish Drivers licenses as a form of ID, if you decide to use your
 passport as a form of ID for the summer it is extremely important you keep it
 safe.
- If your passport is lost/stolen/damaged, please contact the Consulate General of Ireland in Boston at +1 617 267 9330. You will need to speak to the Consulate in order to obtain a travel document that will enable you to make your return journey back to Ireland.
- Remember that if you travel to Canada/Mexico or anywhere outside of the US, you won't be allowed to re-enter the US without a valid machine-readable passport.
- Falsifying or altering a passport is a criminal offence and in the USA a federal offence, punishable by fine, imprisonment and/or refusal of future entry to America.

LOCAL LAWS & SAFETY

- Familiarize yourself with US laws. They can vary from state to state. These laws apply to various substances and activities. While Marijuana use is legal in the state of Massachusetts, it is still considered a Schedule I Drug under federal law. As a J1 visa participant you are subject to federal law and use of federally illegal substances can invalidate your Visa.
- Law enforcement in the US rarely gives a warning for offenses. They act swiftly, so be aware of your actions. Ensure that you are compliant with US laws.
- Keep in mind the disposition of law enforcement personnel may be different in the US than in Ireland. You must treat US police officers with respect. Speak to police officers politely and follow directions.
- Do not drink alcohol (even if you are 21) in public spaces as that is illegal in Boston.
- Do not damage or disrespect your housing or neighbours. Damaging your housing is a crime which can lead to arrest and have serious implications on future travel to the US.




LOCAL LAWS & SAFETY CONTD.

- Do not tamper with your Passport or someone else's passport in an attempt to get around the US legal drinking age of 21 and/or to gain entry to over 21 bars and clubs. Falsifying passports is a federal offence. The punishment can include a fine or imprisonment. Those convicted will also almost certainly be refused entry to the US from that point forward.
- While you are still getting used to the city and finding your way around, exercise precautions. You should always be aware of your surroundings and stick to areas that are well lit and populated especially at night time. Avoid shortcuts you are not familiar with.
- Always carry enough cash for emergency situations (generally enough to get a taxi home).
- Avoid ATMs in dark isolated areas. If you go out on your own or in a small group
 make sure that you are contactable and that a friend knows where you will be.
- Make sure that you leave the contact details of your family back home with a close friend in case of an emergency.
- In case of a life threatening emergency call 911.
- In case of non-emergency call 311 or the Irish Pastoral Centre 617-265-5300




DEPARTURE REQUIREMENTS

- Leave your home address with your employer so that they can send you your final pay check if necessary and your tax documentation (W2) at the end of the year.
- Be sure to close your bank account and utilities before you leave the US, if the account remains open it will collect dormancy fees and you will have debt to pay if you try to use the account in the future.
- Remember to fill out a US tax return form between JANUARY and APRIL 15, 2024.
 You may be eligible for a refund of any taxes you paid whilst in the States.
 Companies like taxback.com and sprintax.com can help you.
- We recommend that participants book flights that are flexible, as plans often change.
- DO NOT overstay your J1 Visa by even one day!
- Keep your Social Security Card extremely safe- it is yours forever! (DO NOT LAMINATE OR ALTER)
- Leave your housing in good condition! CLEAN! Conduct a walk through with the landlord and take photos before returning the keys.



DEPARTURE REQUIREMENTS CONTD.

- Take responsibility! If something is broken, replace it or offer to pay the damages. Leave a positive lasting impression of Irish J1 Students!
- If your neighbors or landlord have been unhappy, it is never too late to make it right – leave a note or apologize in person.
- Keep in touch with your employer and other new contacts as they may be able to provide you with a reference or connections if you return to the US.
- If you have been arrested or received a ticket or violation, be sure to take care of it BEFORE you leave for Ireland.
 Consult an attorney if necessary. The IPC can assist with recommendations.
 These records <u>DO NOT</u> go away and can impact future travel to the US. Be sure to obtain a <u>CERTIFIED</u> copy of any court report. This proves that any infraction has been taken care of correctly. You will need this for future travel to the US or for a J1 Graduate visa application.



DO'S **DONT'S**

- Keep in touch with your Sponsor and Do not get in trouble with the law. notify of them of your arrival in the US.
- · Respect the local laws and police officers.
- Apply for your Social Security number as soon as possible.
- · Leave a positive lasting impression of Irish J1 participants.
- · Reach out to Irish Community Services if you are having difficulty adjusting to life away from home.
- Get a Boston Public Library card this gets you free entry to some attractions.

- · Do not overstay your Visa.
- · Do not engage in any unauthorised work. If you are in the US on the Visa Waiver Program you are NOT authorised to work in the US.
- Do not forget to think about how much money you need to bring. Keep in mind your living costs, including food and rent. Remember that you may not receive your first pay check immediately.
- Do not damage or disrespect your housing.
